5. **Board Executive, Staff and Committee Reports** as presented in the annual report.

President John Olfert welcomed everyone to the Annual General Meeting, and presented the Board Executive report. This "thank you" based report was inspired by the common characteristics of highly successful leaders are that they lead by example and with humility. Thank you's extended to:

- Former leadership, it is notable that this is our 40th year at Volleyball Manitoba
- Our staff, both full time and seasonal, they always do an outstanding job
- Referees
- Sport Manitoba for all the help with the financials, support etc.
- Adult leagues, Men's league is the only one that remains with us today, but we remain hopeful that we can partner with the Women's and Co-Ed leagues in the future.
- This year we hope to move beyond Strategic Plan Implementation to realize:
 - o Improved Communications
 - Grow Programming and resources
 - Grow Membership/resources
 - o Grow VM Community Leadership Group



Staff and Programming Reports:

- John Blacher acknowledged that the number of medals won at the 2017 National/Western Championships was outstanding for Manitoba this year
- Thanks extended to the Canada Games organizing committees as well as the volunteers that helped to make the volleyball competitions successful
- Appreciation also extended to the coaching staffs of all 4 of the Manitoba teams for a good result at 5th for the Men's indoor and both beach teams, and the 1st place finish for the indoor women's team
- Bidding for 2019 National Championship tournament
- Looking for fundraising and other revenue opportunities
- Continued improvement in beach programming for youth
- Scott continues to work closely with schools on coach education and rules / game format delivery.
- Super-Spike was successful had the second highest number of teams this year, with \$100,000 raised to be split between VM plus Kidsport and True North Youth Foundation
- New venues available for indoor and beach Sport for Life, Sargent Park and Dakota. Sargent Park hosted our
 youth leagues this year, resulting in an increase in enrolment.
- Coaching Certification and Screening Compliance very positive improvements this year:
 - o 99% Respect in Sport certification
 - o 95% CRC/CAR compliance
 - o 98% NCCP Coach Certification compliance
- b. Starting in 2019 14U will remain regional (West and East Championships), but 15U and up will be moving to a National model, discontinuing the regional format for 15U and 16U. They will also be moving to a festival model every second year instead of every third year.
- 6. Financial Report is presented by Roger Labossiere (Treasurer). Highlights include:
 - 2016-17 operating surplus of \$15,700, overall net position of \$50,698.
 - Financially on a stable footing.
 - Fiscal 2017-18 operating budget was also prepared and presented, outlining a break even budget.
 - Volleyball Canada fees increasing by \$1.00 this season, no change per member for Volleyball Manitoba Fees. A competitive membership will change from \$71.00 to \$72.00 per member
 - Staff and Auditors thanked

President's Report Contribution to the 2018 Annual Report and Annual General Meeting



Contained in this 2018 Annual Report are financial statements, reports describing performance and accomplishments, and plans for the future. In this regard, I am pleased to report, on behalf of the Volleyball Manitoba (VM) board, staff and membership that 2018 was a good year. More specifically:

- The organization is financially stable;
- VM's full- and part-time employees are talented, motivated and provide results that are exponentially better than the limited resources at their disposal;
- Membership remains steady;
- VM remains a relevant, valued and contributing organization in the broader Manitoba sports community and with Volleyball Canada; and
- The work/effort of volunteers, staff and other stakeholders have ensured that there are adequate facilities, officials, coaches, and other resources to allow volleyball to be played indoors, on the beach, from grassroots school and other introductory programs to adult leagues, and at a host of levels (ranging from junior high, high school, club, high-performance and provincial programs).

With these assertions evidenced and described throughout this report, allow me to venture away from traditional reporting, and share a story and life-lesson taught by a 14U athlete from Selkirk. The story occurred in Saskatoon at the 2010 14U National Championships. Early in my coaching career, it was my first experience coaching outside of Manitoba. On Day 2, we were playing a match against another western province team, which would determine whether my team would advance to the Tier 1 division on Sunday morning. As we played, there was a sudden lift in volume as cheers for my team could be heard from the second level balcony seating. Looking up, I saw the 14U Royals VC boys team cheering for us – a team that we had been battling all season long (and who had just finished their own match early – also progressing to Sunday's Tier 1 bracket).

Ironically, the team I was coaching and the Royals team were staying at the same hotel, and not surprisingly we were having dinner at the same all-you-can-eat buffet near the hotel. As both teams were shoveling food onto plates in the buffet line, I asked one of the young Royals players what prompted them to come cheer for us. With no hesitation, the young man looked at me and said, "We want what's best for Manitoba volleyball."

His comment stuck with me. Fast forward one year, and the 14U team I was coaching just qualified on Day 2 for Sunday's Tier 1 playoffs. Abandoning our routine post-match talk, I told my guys that we were going to go rush over and cheer for Providence (our nemesis that season) who were playing two courts over, also playing to compete in Sunday's Tier 1 group. With confusion in their eyes, they asked, "Coach, why are we cheering for Providence?" – to which I quoted my 13-year old teacher from the year before, "Because its what's best for Manitoba Volleyball."

In the years since, I have been humbled and appreciative that as I have visited with coaches (friends and arch-rivals alike), officials, past presidents and board members — asking for advice about technique, strategy, working with athletes, strength and conditioning, and later about board history and governance — *no one has ever turned me away*. Rather everyone in the VM community has openly shared their experiences (successes and failures), suggestions to improve, counsel and assistance.

Be encouraged that the state of volleyball is sound, as its foundation remains on the effort, commitment and character of players, coaches, officials, staff and volunteers who "do what's best for Manitoba Volleyball!"

2017-18 Volleyball Manitoba Board of Directors

Directors Entering Year 2 (of their 2-year term):

- Morgan Cheyne (Member) has been a PE Teacher since 2009 and currently teaches at DMCI in Winnipeg. Morgan is currently a member of the VM Beach Volleyball Committee, was the Head Coach of our men's beach team at the 2017 Canada Games and 2015 and 2011 WCSG, and has initiated and organized the Jr High Beach VB Challenge the past 3 years. He has also been involved as a club coach for many years, worked as an assistant coach at the University of Winnipeg from 2014 present, and competed as an athlete for UW in 2008-09.
- Glen Cook (Director 1 year term concluded) has served as a VM board member since 2014, and has been active in Manitoba's volleyball community since the early 1980's. He coached his daughter while she grew up and continues to play in the Winnipeg Men's Volleyball League (WMVL). He has been involved in executive roles with the WMVL since the early 1990's and has been the president for the last 17 years. In the role as president, he arranges over 900 games per year for WMVL working on all aspects of the administration of the game including; governance, budgets, schedules, contracts, financial management, disciplinary issues etc. Glen is a lifelong resident of Winnipeg, is a professional engineer by training working with Manitoba Hydro for over 30 years.
- Jayme Menzies (Director) has served as a VM board director since 2013. Jayme played five years as a University of Winnipeg varsity volleyball athlete and continues to enjoy Manitoba's senior coed, indoor and beach leagues. She is a lawyer who, in her free time, focuses her attentions on promoting and facilitating the physical, cultural and mental well-being of youth across the province through coaching sport. She was involved last summer with the 2017 North American Indigenous Games as head volleyball coach and 2017 Canada Games as the indoor volleyball assistant coach.
- Rachelle Needham (Secretary 1 year term concluded) was elected to the Volleyball Manitoba board in 2012. She has been involved in the volleyball community primarily as a parent to two daughters that have played and coached at the school and club levels. In addition to the VM board, she sits as a member of the board for Belgian Alliance Credit Union. Rachelle lives in Winnipeg, and works as a senior project analyst at Manitoba Health.
- **Tom Neufeld (Director)** has served as a board member since 2015, and served as the chair of the Marketing Committee this past year. He has been an active member of the volleyball community as a player in school, provincial teams and senior men's; as a coach in the boys and girls club system since 2006 and as a referee both indoor and beach since 2008. Employed in the financial services business, Tom is a portfolio manager and investment advisor with CIBC Wood Gundy for the past 20+ years.

Director Representing Affiliated Association

- Azad Hosein (Referee Director) has been involved with volleyball since Grade 6 after moving from Trinidad. The transition from outdoor sports to indoor took some adjustments. Azad played all the school sports at Hastings Junior High and Dakota Collegiate up to Grade 11. During the Grade 12 year, he focused on Cricket ultimately making the National Team. While taking his Commerce Degree at the University of Manitoba, he started coaching volleyball at Hastings Junior High. In 1991 Azad took the Level I Referee's course and became an International Referee in 2002. He has refereed over 100 International matches but particularly still enjoys refereeing Age Class and High School volleyball. Azad was selected as the Regional Officials Chairperson in September, 2015.

- Tim Au (Director) has served as a VM board member since 2012. Tim has been a lifelong active member in Manitoba's volleyball community as he transitioned from an athlete in the high school and club systems into a volunteer and coach. As we get closer to 2019, Volleyball Manitoba will once again be embarking on a process to review accomplishments and shortfalls of this Strategic Plan, while establishing a new plan that will help us determine the goals and objectives we want to pursue as the provincial sport organization for volleyball for 2020-2024.

Our province has a passion for our sport, boasting a rich history of volleyball success at the local, national and international levels that we want to see continue into the future.

VOLLEYBALL PROGRAMS

2018 Volleyball Manitoba Premier Tournaments

Volleyball Manitoba continued its development of a Premier Tournament Series for club volleyball this past season with the organization of events for all age categories (13u - 18u) over five weekends with 135 teams competing overall. The schedule included the following (team #'s in brackets):

These events help support and enforce the provincial ranking process along with other sanctioned tournaments that are organized by clubs around the province.

Moving Forward: The plan for 2019 will again be to organize events at each of the 13U-18U age categories with the schedule being determined early this fall. The Indoor Competitions Committee is also reviewing the possibility of doing two events for certain categories, but limitations are with weekends and facilities. Also looking at the option of making these Premier events mandatory for Provincial Championship rankings, and also the possibility of using other larger club hosted tournaments part of the 'Premier' ranking series.

2018 Provincial Championships



The 2018 Volleyball Manitoba Provincial Championships were held over three weekends in April & May with events being held in Winnipeg, Brandon and Steinbach. In total, 13 different championships were organized involving 191 teams. Numbers once again warranted a Tier 2 provincial championship to be held in the 14U Girls category. Expanding the tier 2 category for growth and meaningful competition reasons is a focus for VM as we move forward in the coming years.

Participation in provincial championships is increasing gradually year over year, as the following charts show:

Moving forward: We will continue attempts to minimize the number of venues, or use clustered facilities, as much as possible, while also addressing appropriate serving and free space, along with the spectator experience. Other notes:

- The use of the new Dakota Community Centre (6 courts) this past year has been extremely beneficial for the delivery of events.
- The use of ranking pools based for the preliminary round robin received mostly positive feedback. Continue to review and consider number of games played on each day of the two day tournaments.
- Continue to strive towards early schedule releases.
- Looking into webcasting options for 2019.

2018 Volleyball Canada National Championships

Volleyball Manitoba would like to congratulate all the Manitoba teams who competed in this year's 2018 Volleyball Canada Championships that were held as a festival event in Edmonton from May 17-22. In total, 113 teams from Manitoba competed in this year's championships, up from 107 in 2017. As a province, Manitoba continues to send the fourth most teams to national championships events, behind AB (319 - 2018), ON (121 - 2018) & BC (151 - 2018) and ranks among the highest in teams attending in relation to number of teams participating in their respective provincial championships (59% - only host Alberta higher at 64%).

Moving forward: As previously determined, 2019 sees the 15U – 18U events all true nationals, with only the 14U age category events played regionally. In 2020, the VC Nationals will again be a Festival event, as they move to a new two year cycle instead of the current three year cycle. Volleyball Manitoba is currently working with Tourism Winnipeg to bid on a 2021 event at the RBC Convention Centre Winnipeg.

2018 Team Manitoba Junior, Youth & Select Programs

Each year, Volleyball Manitoba contributes to the continued development of our performance athletes by running Provincial Teams for 15U – 18U athletes. The goal of these programs is to provide our top athletes with a high-level development opportunity both on and off the court. They receive coaching from some of Manitoba's best coaches, play with and against the best athletes from across Manitoba & Canada in their respective age category, get an opportunity to represent their province on Team Toba, build lifelong friendships, and build life skills that will benefit them in the future.

This summer, Volleyball Manitoba selected players for the **2018 Team Manitoba Junior** (2000, 2001 or later), **Youth** (2001, 2001 or later) and **Select** (2002, 2003 or later) programs. The selection camps wrapped up on June 3 with players being selected for the programs, plus several additional athletes chosen to be a part of provincial training programs. The teams trained this summer out of the Canada Games Sport for Life Centre and Dakota Community Centre, with the Junior Teams competing in the 2018 US High Performance Championship in Tulsa, OK from July 22-29 and the Youth & Select Teams competing in the Canada Cup in Richmond, BC, from July 20th-July 23rd at the Richmond Olympic Oval.

See <u>Appendix C</u> for complete rosters of players and coaches of all teams that represented Manitoba at the US HP Championship and Canada Cup competitions.

Moving forward: The Provincial Performance Committee will continue to review the summer programs with the goal to develop and deliver the best programs possible, as we look short term towards the 2019 Western Canada Games and 2021 Canada Games, and long term towards future games and ultimately placing more athletes on national team programs.

2018 Team Manitoba Girls Select and Boys Future Select (athletes born in 2003-2006)

2018 once again saw a Provincial level training program to introduce younger players to the skills and concepts used by the Select, Youth and Junior teams. The goal of the program is an earlier introduction to Provincial level programming to help us to build a stronger program as well as connect earlier with this age group who will be the next group of Canada Games indoor athletes. This program was delivered over 3 days from July 4-6 involving a full day training schedule at Dakota Community Centre with the participation of over 34 girls and 21 boys. The program was once again led by Arnd Ludwig, former head coach of the Canadian Women's National Team.

2017 Team Manitoba Beach Development Program

Volleyball Manitoba organized a weekly Beach Volleyball development training program this past summer at the Sargent Park Beach Volleyball Centre. The program involved 12 athletes training under the direction of Chloe Reimer McCaughan where they learned the skills and concepts of the beach game.

Moving forward: With the support of our Beach Volleyball and Provincial Performance Committees, we will be reviewing the delivery and structure of our beach volleyball training and development programs, and will be considering a program this fall & winter out of the new indoor beach volleyball centre in East St Paul as we look to support the development of athletes for the 2019 Western Canada Games and the 2021 Canada Games.

2018 Beach Volleyball Provincial Championships

Manitoba's Beach Volleyball Provincial Champions were crowned over the August 10-12 weekend Sargent Park Beach Volleyball Centre, with 48 teams in eight categories competing (growth from 39 teams across 5 categories in 2017). We would like to thank and congratulate all the teams who participated in the extreme heat over the weekend!

Results of the Beach Volleyball Provincial Championships can be found in Appendix D.

Moving forward: With the support of our Beach Volleyball Committee, we will continue to review the delivery of our Beach Volleyball Programs and Provincial Championships and how we can encourage more teams to participate in the Volleyball Canada Nationals.



2018 Beach Volleyball National Championships

Volleyball Canada held a combined Adult & Youth Beach Volleyball Championship at Ashbridges Bay in Toronto from August 16-19. Congratulations to the following four Manitoba teams who travelled and competed at the National Championship event:

2018 Beach Volleyball League & Tournaments

The 2018 Summer Series Beach Volleyball League, which included Adult and Youth 2's, were all organized this summer out of the Sargent Park Beach Volleyball Centre. The full move of all league categories from Adrenaline Adventures to Sargent Park has been positive, with all ten courts being used Monday through Thursday evenings, from early June through August.

A separate league was also organized this past season by Beach Bandits out of Melrose Park CC, affiliating itself with Volleyball Manitoba through membership.

The youth league also implemented a coaching/training component and timed matches, as well as an earlier end to the season. Initial feedback on the changes have been positive and we will look to continue to build on that success.



In an effort to establish a bigger marquee beach event, Volleyball Manitoba partnered with the AVP Beach Volleyball Tour to deliver **AVP First (14U - 18U)** and **AVP Next (Adult Open)** Beach Tournaments at Sargent Park on Saturday, July 28 (Youth) & Sunday, July 29 (Adult). The event was delivered with good review involving 16 adult and 15 youth teams, and the AVP Regional Tour promoter looks forward to working with us to grow the event in future years.



Volleyball Manitoba also supported or coordinated various other tournaments throughout the season, including support for the Stefan Savoie Memorial Tournament in July at Sargent Park that raised funds for the memorial scholarship program, as well as the High School Championship and Jr High Beach Challenge in May & June.

Moving forward: We will continue to review the delivery of beach leagues and tournaments for 2019 and beyond, including our role with the High School Beach Volleyball Tournament held annually at the end of May as well as the expansion of league categories into a secondary facility next season.

2017 Junior High Challenge / Grade 9 Open

At the end of each school season, Volleyball Manitoba has organized the Junior High Challenge and Grade 9 Open events. These events have not historically been official championships as they have been open to all teams for participation. This past year, however, working with divisional Phys Ed Supervisors the Grade 8 event was re-structured as a championship tournament involving winning teams from school divisions in Winnipeg and around the province. Also, for the first time in many years all four tournaments were held, with 35 teams in total involved.

Initiation Programs

Volleyball Manitoba continues to deliver and support early initiation programming, such as at the 12U or Grades 5-7 levels. A Grades 5-7 programs was delivered in the fall of 2017 at the Sport for Life Centre with approximately 36 young volleyball players and a similar program was delivered in Selkirk in March & April 2018.

The format of these programs uses the Volleyball Canada recommended 4 on 4 model with smaller badminton sized courts and nets. The programs fit well at the beginning of the ice sports seasons (Sept-Oct) and between the conclusion of winter ice sports and the beginning of soccer season (April/May).

Moving forward: This coming season we will again be looking at fall & spring programs and we would also like to see the program expand to other locations across the province with a similar format.

2018 Winter Youth League

Volleyball Manitoba was pleased to offer a new program this past winter for athletes looking to play volleyball in the winter of 2018. The Winter Youth Volleyball League was created to provide skill instruction and game play opportunities to players who are newer to the game or have played school volleyball but may not be playing club volleyball. Divisions included a Grade 6/7 category (born in 2006/07) and a Grade 8/9 category (born in 2004/05).

The Grade 6/7 program was organized out of the Canada Games Sport for Life Centre from January through March (8 week program) and the Grade 8/9 out of Dakota Community Centre from January through April (11 weeks). The programs involved one 45-60 minute training session per week plus games being played on Sundays. In total, 51 athletes participated in the Grade 6/7 league with 42 in the Grade 8/9.



Bilateral Program - Regional Development

Volleyball Manitoba receives funding support from the Sport Manitoba Bilateral Program to provide development opportunities to persons from under-represented and/or marginalized populations throughout the province to actively participate in sport. In 2017-18, the following programs were delivered:

Sitting Volleyball


In conjunction with Volleyball Canada, Volleyball Manitoba organized a 'Learn to Play Sitting Volleyball' session on Saturday, March 3 at College Jeanne Sauve. The session was open to para and able bodied athletes and was coordinated around 'Limb Loss Awareness Day', an event that was held the previous day at the convention centre. Although participation was low for the sitting volleyball session, the national team coaches that were in attendance at the Limb Loss Awareness expo made good networks and identified a couple new potential athletes from Manitoba for the national team programs. Current sitting national team member, Chris Bird from Brandon, also helped with this event.

Adult Senior Volleyball

Several volleyball leagues exist throughout the province that provide playing opportunities for adults once they are done with school, age class or post-secondary levels of our sport. This is important as we strive to promote active for life involvement in volleyball. With only the Winnipeg Men's Volleyball League (WMVL) as indoor adult members of Volleyball Manitoba (in addition to beach leagues), efforts continue to gain membership from other leagues and we continue to work on identifying and providing benefits and services that our adult members may desire in order for them to consider affiliating themselves as members of our association.

Super-Spike 2018

Super-Spike combines Western Canada's largest outdoor volleyball tournament with a weekend-long concert series, all set in a festival atmosphere, with the event having taken place on Friday, July 20th and Saturday, July 21st at Maple Grove Rugby Park. It was the second year of the event being organized through Volleyball Manitoba (previously through the Winnipeg-based, Team Canada office).







Moving Forward: The Super-Spike organizing committee will continue to review the event, trying to gain a better understanding of the decrease in participation. Super-Spike is intended in part to provide revenue for Volleyball Manitoba operations, along with annual contributions to local charities, and adjustments in the planning will need to be made to manage expenses in line with lower participation numbers as well as increasing revenue opportunities for next year.



TECHNICAL LEADERSHIP

Coaching Clinics & Development

The Volleyball Canada Development (former level 1) and Advanced Development (former level 2) coach levels have now been fully implemented since 2017. These levels remain the responsibility of the Provincial Associations. The Performance coach level (former level 3) has shifted to become the responsibility of Volleyball Canada. Candidates are nominated or can apply to attend the Performance coach workshops currently offered in the summers by Volleyball Canada.

This past year two Development coach workshops were delivered, one in January and one in April, with a total of 22 coaches involved and an Advanced Development workshop was also delivered this past June with 9 coaches participating.

Volleyball Manitoba is also proud to support the annual **BU Volleyball Coaches Summit** that took place on Thursday, September 28, 2017. This year's 2018 clinic is scheduled for Thursday, September 27 and the **Volleyball Coaching Seminar** returns this year at the University of Winnipeg on Friday, September 7.

Moving Forward: Volleyball Manitoba will begin this fall to update our Learning Facilitators and train Evaluators. We will also be confirming early this fall a schedule of Development and Advanced Development workshops for this fall, winter and spring. We will also start communicating with coaches this year about the Continuing Education credits they will need in the coming years to maintain existing certification levels.

Coach Screening Compliance & Certification Requirements

Volleyball Manitoba maintains and requires certain standards for coaches of club volleyball teams, in line with Volleyball Canada and Sport Manitoba. These include certification expectations with NCCP, Respect in Sport and Screening requirements. Volleyball Manitoba would like to once again acknowledge and thank all of the clubs for their efforts this past season with encouraging and ensuring that coaches and directors meet the required screening and certification requirements.

With the NCCP Coach Certification policy, there were 180 head coaches at Provincials this past April/May, with 95% meeting the requirements (with those not meeting the requirements for Provincial Championships paying a fine or



registration fee to attend the required clinic). For the Respect in Sport requirement, 98% of our coaches (379 of 385) met the requirement of completing the on-line course. With the Criminal Record Search and Child Abuse Registry requirement, screening 94% of our coaches submitted proper documentation at the time of Provincial Championships. All outstanding screening documentation was 'In Process' at the time of the coaches respective Provincial Championship, and coaches were to submit their results to the Volleyball Manitoba once it was received.

Moving Forward: Volleyball Manitoba will be continuing to enforce these screening and certification requirements, and clubs are encouraged to continue to be pro-active this coming year with ensuring coaches achieve full compliance at the start of the season.





Referee Development Report

The number of leagues using MVOA officials has been increasing in Manitoba. Our goal in the next 2 years is to maintain a high retention rate and recruit graduating high school students. This year we trained students who refereed in the junior high leagues. We are hoping for a high rate of attendance at our Level I Clinic in September.

Canada Games in July/August 2017 was very successful for referees in both the indoor and beach competitions. The support and assistance from Volleyball Manitoba and Sport Manitoba were instrumental in a successful Canada Games. I strongly recommend the National Promotions Committee use future Canada Games for upgrading.

Highlights for the 2017-18 season:

- Certified 13 Beach Referees, with 12 active throughout the summer.
- Assigned 34 referees to various National Championships (indoor and beach).
- Trained 22 referee on the E-Scoresheet.

Challenges we are facing in the upcoming year:

- Complete our By-Laws and Policies.
- Webcast or Recertification Clinic in the Fall of 2019.
- Have full compliance of all officials with the Criminal Record Check, and Child Abuse Check done in September 2018.

In 2017-18 there were 11 L1 Referee certification or re-certification clinics (8 in previous year) organized throughout the province (Winnipeg, Brandon, Winkler, Lac du Bonnet, Russell, Nelson House, Norway House) with 246 attending the courses (237 the previous year). Six Novice clinics were also delivered with 136 participants targeted towards high school students wanting to officiate at the JV and Jr High levels. In 2017-18 there were 139 referees registered as Volleyball Manitoba members through the MVOA (146 the previous year).

Once again the support from Scott Borys (Volleyball Canada) and John Blacher with the Volleyball Manitoba staff enables us to grow our indoor and outdoor programs.

Moving forward: Continue to work with the MVOA on recruitment, retention and development of referees throughout Manitoba.

FINANCIAL REPORT & STATEMENTS

Volleyball Manitoba (VM) Finance Committee Report – September, 2018 Submitted by Roger Labossiere, Board Treasurer & Chair Finance Committee

Financial results and position for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2018 are presented in the audited financial statements included in this Annual Report.

As reflected in the financial statements and this brief report, results are consistent with the annual approved budget, and represent the work and activity of VM for fiscal 2018 (April 1, 2017 to March 31, 2018).

In summary;

- 1. <u>Financial Position</u>. As reflected on the Statement of Financial Position, given an operating deficit of \$5,291 during fiscal 2018, Unrestricted Net Assets changed from \$50,698 to \$45,407.
 - While not having a specific target or mandate to accumulate a reserve, VM's Board of Directors is comfortable with this level of excess cash to manage seasonal and year-to-year programming and cashflow fluctuations experienced by VM.

2. Fiscal 2018 Operating Results.

The Statement of Operations reflects a number of hi-lights for VM's fiscal 2018 activity. These include:

- Receipts from Sport Manitoba Grants were lower in F2018 compared to F2017 by \$46,434, however \$27,706
 relating to Team Canada National Team support and \$16,750 relating to Athlete Assistance are offset by matching
 lower expenses.
- Other Grants/Funders were lower in F2018 compared to F2017 by \$21,730 due to the elimination of the Volleyball Canada grant of \$37,286, however there was an increase of \$16,921 in Student and Other Grants.
- Membership levels and revenues remained steady.
- Decreases in Athlete Programs fees and the offsetting Athlete Development Programs expenses are the result of the 2016 Manitoba Games (14U boys and girls volleyball) – this accounts for approximately \$36K of the variances of both the revenue and expenses.
- Provincial Teams revenue increase of \$48,439 is offset with an increase of \$42,120 in Provincial Teams expenses.
- Decreases in Volleyball Manitoba Tournaments revenues are the result of the 14U Western Nationals being hosted in Winnipeg in F2017 (this accounted for \$137,714 of the difference). Club and Beach tournament revenue was \$33,363 higher in F2018 compared to F2017.
- Sponsorship/Fundraising increased by \$14,519 due to auction and raffles.
- Superspike revenue of \$490,682 less expenses of \$440,454 added a net \$50,228 to Volleyball Manitoba programming. Fiscal 2018 was the first year where VM was a beneficiary of a portion of the Superspike proceeds.
- 3. <u>Looking Forward to Fiscal 2019</u>. During the spring of 2018, VM staff prepared, and the Board of Directors reviewed and approved the fiscal 2019 Operating Budget.
 - The budget quantifies a number of realities and initiatives. Overall, we are budgeting for a modest surplus of \$10,700. Below is a detailed Statement of Operations which reflects consistent programming similar to F2018.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the members of Manitoba Volleyball Association Inc.,

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Manitoba Volleyball Association Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2018, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flow for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Manitoba Volleyball Association Inc. as at March 31, 2018, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended March 31, 2018

1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

Operating as Volleyball Manitoba, the Manitoba Volleyball Association Inc. is a non-profit organization and is exempt from income tax in accordance with Section 149 of the Canadian Income Tax Act. The purpose of the organization is to provide quality services and programs that will assist in the promotion, development, and growth of volleyball in Manitoba

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements of the organization have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and liabilities are at amortized cost unless otherwise noted. Financial assets and liabilities measured at amortized cost consist of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and deferred revenue.

It is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant credit, currency, interest rate, liquidity or market risks arising from these financial instruments, unless otherwise noted.

Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost and are being amortized on the straight line basis at the following rates based on estimated useful life, except in the year of acquisition, when one-half of the rate is used:

The organization reviews capital assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution.

Contributed services

A substantial number of volunteers contribute a significant amount of their time each year. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair market value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for Sport Manitoba contributions. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are recognized.

The organization accounts for other revenues using the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements, as well as reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. These estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty, and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

3. BANK INDEBTEDNESS

The company has a line of credit available to a maximum of \$25,000, repayable on demand with interest at the rate of prime plus 3%. Bank indebtedness is secured by general security agreement providing a floating charge on all assets of the organization.
